The Theme for World No Tobacco Day 2024 centered on "Protecting Children From Tobacco Industry Interference". With 8 million deaths annually from tobacco consumption, it is imperative to: a) spread awareness about the risks of tobacco use; b) conduct oral cancer screening tests in communities; and c) encourage smokers and tobacco users to quit.

ICS screened nearly 2,000 people for Oral Cancer and provided Tobacco Cessation Counselling to tobacco users in a campaign that covered 20 villages of Kalaghatagi Taluk (Dharwad). These kinds of community-based interventions can go a long way in lessening the adverse impact of tobacco.



With confirmed CSR donations, our project sizes have expanded, necessitating additional training, team building and an increase in team members. I welcome Dr Swathi Acharya and all new joinees to the team.

An excerpt from the online article: Why a New Study Dubbed India the 'Cancer Capital of the World' - Time.com

In India, the number of cancer cases is expected to rise at a rate that will surpass global averages—from 1.39 million in 2020 to 1.57 million by 2025. Among women, the most common forms of cancer are breast cancer, cervix cancer, and ovarian cancer. Among men, they are lung cancer, mouth cancer, and prostate cancer. While men generally report a 25% higher incidence of cancer than women globally, India bucks this trend with more women getting diagnosed with cancer.

The high incidence of cancer stems from a mix of environmental and socioeconomic factors, like high levels of pollution, as well as lifestyle and dietary preferences. Almost <u>40% of cancer cases in India</u> are due to rampant tobacco use, which significantly elevates the risk of lung, oral, and throat cancers, while factors like poor diet and lack of physical activity cause 10% of cases.

Community Based Intervention for Oral Cancer Screening and Tobacco Cessation

In collaboration with the SDM College of Dental Sciences and Hospital (Dharwad), we took up Oral cancer screening and tobacco cessation in 20 villages of Kalaghatagi Taluk covering 1,950 beneficiaries. Considered as a backward Taluk of Karnataka, Kalaghatagi has a <u>high prevalence of</u> <u>smokeless tobacco usage</u>.

Famous local comedian and social media influencer, **Gangavati Pranesh** sent an appeal video to encourage the villagers to enrol in the campaign.
